

CHAMPION OBO II.

A. K. C. S. B. 4911.

Whelped August 7, 1882. Weight about 23 lbs. He has a nice, flat, glossy, black coat, and very heavy feathered, short, straight legs, a good disposition, and is in the field, a first-class worker and a true cocker. His record as a show dog and sire cannot be equaled by any spaniel in America or England, as he has never been beaten on the bench, and his stock has won more prizes than that of any other spaniel known. He is the *sire* or *grandsire* of nearly every principal prize winning cocker in this country. He has been exhibited and won the following prizes: 1st Manchester, N. H., Sept., 1883, Championship and special for best cocker, Lowell, Mass., Dec., 1883, 1st and special for best cocker, New Haven, Conn., March, 1884, Championship and special for best cocker owned by a member of the A. C. S. Club, New York, May, 1884, Championship and stud dog prize for spaniels, Philadelphia, Pa., 1884, 1st and special for best cocker dog, special for best cocker, special with Shina for best brace, and special as one of best kennel, New Haven, Conn., 1885, Championship, Boston, 1885. CHAMPION BLACK PETE.

Black Pete is a very handsome, long, low, solid, Black Spaniel weighing about 27 lbs. He has a nice head, very heavy muzzle, dark eyes, ears long, set low and carried perfectly, coat flat, feather very heavy, legs, feet and body first-class; his success as a show dog and sire speaks for his quality; when only 11 months old he won first prize in open class and special for best cocker at Newark, N. J., first at New Haven and Boston, winning his championship at New York, May 4, 1886, when but a year old, at Boston, 1887, he won championship and special for best cocker dog and special with three of his get for *best stud* cocker, one of his get winning the Produce Stakes of the American Spaniel Club for best cocker bred in 1886, at New York, Feb. 1889, he was shown once more, and won first in the challenge class, and was then withdrawn from exhibition. At New York, Feb. 1890, his get again won the Produce Stakes for *best cocker bred in 1889*; first and second prizes in the open black cocker bitch class, and first prize in the novice class. JERSEY OBO.

A. K. C. S. B. 17952.

Whelped Feb. 6, 1890. Jersey Obo is a solid black cocker weighing about 26 lbs., he has a good head and muzzle, eyes dark, ears nicely placed and carried perfectly, coat flat, good legs, feet and body, a fine mover showing lots of true spaniel character. This dog I believe is to make his mark as a stock dog if one can judge by his quality and that of his sire and dam; his grand dams Blackie III and Darkie have proven themselves to have been the best two brood bitches in this country, for throwing winning cockers to Obo II; an examination of the breeding of this dog should amply demonstrate the value of this blood in cocker breeding to all spaniel fanciers.
